

"The Religion Trap" A Reflection by B. Sidney Smith

A friend of mine since high school, the actor and conservative commentator Joseph Philips, refers to liberals as "the good people." You can almost hear the scare quotes when he says it - he is referring to the habit of many on the political left of adopting an air of moral distinction. As someone who was active in the Green Party for several years, I am only too familiar with such virtue-signaling behavior.

The devil always works both sides, so virtue signaling is rampant on the political right, too. Wendy's tenure on the school board taught me that every candidate for office in these parts puts "I'm a Christian" at the top of their talking points; it's the shiboleth that shows you are the right sort, one of "the good people."

I thought of all this when I previewed today's Gospel reading, in which Jesus gives his opinion of those who wear their religion as a badge. So many people treat Christian faith as a simple matter of believing and belonging. I confess that when I converted that's pretty much what I did. Joining the club and attending the meetings, espousing the right beliefs, maybe trying a little harder to avoid obvious sin - that's right?

The trouble with a religion of believing and belonging is that it appeals to our vanity. The moral distinction of embracing the "right" faith invites us to begin thinking of ourselves as one of "the good people." We can begin to act - without any effort at all, almost without noticing - as though we had God and Jesus and ourselves all figured out.

There is no love in this. As Jesus remarks about the Pharisees, "All their works are performed to be seen." Virtue signaling is the first step in cancel culture; to declare oneself uniquely clean is to declare others Unclean. Unfit. Unworthy. And, finally, Unwelcome.

That is not the example Christ gave us. As Father Jim likes to remind us, He had friends in low places. He did not come to call the righteous. His example was an example of service, of sacrifice, and finally of *kenosis*, the complete emptying of Himself, His life poured out, in blood and water, for the sake of all.

Having come to believe and belong, which are good things in themselves, I found that I was called to something more. Believing and belonging was only stage 1 in a program of radical personal transformation. I am called to be like Him. Like a caterpillar in the chrysalis, He calls me to lose the self I know, for the sake of metamorphosis into the self I'm meant to be. To lose my life, so that I may live.

And of course I can't do it, not on my own. So, Sunday finds me at Mass, offering myself with such humility as I can muster, to the One in whose death and resurrection I am, with profound astonishment, invited to participate. And all my boasting evaporates, like dew under the sun.
