

For some Native American Indian Tribes, there was a rite of passage where a young man spends time along in the wilderness. He survives a hostile environment of weather, predatory animals and lack of food. But the biggest challenge is the inner journey. It is a spiritual journey where he will be encountered within goodness and evil. Hopefully, he will display a change in behavior when he returns to his people. He will be recognized as a mature member of the community.

I believe that the diet that John the Baptist ate spoke to a vision quest of his own. Living in the desert, his diet consisted of locusts and wild honey. Locusts are a symbol of judgement and wild honey is a symbol of blessing. John confronted his own shortcomings and blessings. I spoke of his light side "or child of the Light" and his own goodness weeks ago. He was ready to accept the Messiah to come in Spirit and in truth. Then he spoke of that vision. Later they would kill the visionary, but they could not destroy the vision.

Others who came out to listen to John said, "This man has something and I want some of that!" Remember, these are the castaways that the Pharisees would not have anything to do with. They are the people who were not allowed in the temple. They had been in a desert of their own, confronting the guilt of being unworthy, falling short of the Law of Moses and being ostracized. To them came the baptism and forgiveness of sin as free as water. They had listened to the voices of locusts and judgement. No, it was time to pay attention to the blessings now and the blessings the Messiah bring. They lived a "Vision Quest" in day to day life.

Advent and Christmas Season is full of locusts and wild honey. There is an increase in depression and sadness while we listen to the over-the-top celebrating while remembering losses and deaths. The person with us last Christmas no longer speaks to us. She/ he has died. There may be the guilt and sorrow for past behaviors. We may live in Southside Virginia where the temperature is cool this time of year, but we can be in a desert. In the light of John and in the light of the stories about the Messiah, what can we learn bout ourselves?

There is the wild honey. There are memories that make us feel joyful and alive. There are hopes. After all, our vision quest does contain a vision. We allow our culture and society to be our spiritual desert. Might I love again Might I allow myself to make plans for getting together? What is my vision for the one who is with us but is yet to come? How can I know him better?

"See Thee more clearly. Follow Thee more nearly. Love thee more dearly. Day by day." (Godspell)

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent. The third candle lit in our Advent Wreath today is rose. It is also known as "Gaudete Sunday."

Today, the Catholic church uses the color rose to indicate a joyful feast day or holiday. Gaudete Sunday's counterpart in Lent is "Lactare Sunday", another break in penance to rejoice in hope as we approach Easter. During both days, the priest wears rose vestments. Also, today, Fr. Jim will do an anointing of the sick during mass.

Next Sunday is the Fourth [and final] Week of Advent: This year's calendar presents a unique situation. Next Sunday is not only the Fourth Sunday of Advent, but also Christmas Eve. In order to facilitate the taping of the Christmas Mass this Tuesday, the Liturgy Team will meet tomorrow at 10:00 am to partially decorate the altar. We are scheduled to meet again on Thursday, December 21, at 1:00 pm to continue readying the altar for Christmas Eve and Christmas morning masses. Teamwork - that's what it's all about!
