

A REFLECTION by B. Sidney Smith

Everybody's Looking For Him.

G.K. Chesterton wrote that "the one real objection to the Christian religion is simply that it is one religion. The world is a big place, full of very different kinds of people." I suspect many people abandon their Catholic faith, or never find it in the first place, for this reason. After all, what claim to Revelation can Catholics have that is any better than the Truth-with-a-capital-T that Buddhists, Muslims, or even principled Atheists have?

Before I became a Catholic as a young adult, I embarked on many spiritual paths. As a teen I took an interest in occult mysticism, like Rosicrucianism and the Qabalah. Subsequently I studied yoga quite seriously for a few years, particularly what is called Raja Yoga, which is all about meditation and spiritual growth. Obviously, I was looking for something.

Who isn't? Even young people, healthy and with every material advantage, are never fundamentally contented. They seek to fill the empty spaces of their soul with material success, or with fame, or with expensive habits or recreations. They look for a lover to cancel the anxiety about themselves that torments them in lonely hours.

The sick, the poor, and the oppressed seek healing, relief, and freedom. The elderly seek comfort, the anxious reassurance. All seek peace.

This seems universal; everyone is looking for something. Sometimes they think they've found it, only to realize, soon or in time, that no, that wasn't really IT. To me, visiting New Age bookstores (this was the 70s) to scrounge for tomes of occult wisdom, it seemed as though I were being called-to, almost as if by a voice saying, "come, learn, see."

It was a long time before I really understood what I was looking for.

In today's Gospel reading from Mark, the apostles go searching for Jesus to tell Him, "Everybody's looking for you." Jesus doesn't respond to this directly. He knows, of course, that He is what people seek.

The one real advantage of the Christian religion, to paraphrase Chesterton, is that it has Christ. We are blessed to have actually met, almost to the point of shaking hands, that which is the crown and culmination of every human longing. Our faith has taught us not only what it is we seek, but where and how to find Him.

Not everyone comes to Christ through the front door. I didn't. Some have to cut a hole in the roof and come in that way, like the paralytic at Capernaum. Those of other faith traditions have their own doorways. Many in our society, burdened with misunderstandings about Christian faith, find the doorway blocked in their own minds, but don't stop seeking.

Those of us blessed to have met Christ understand that the end of all our longing is an unfathomable reward: to walk beside Him. As He said to the apostles, "Let's get going."
